

£55k raised through overnight walk

Saturday, 24th June saw nearly 500 women dressed in pink T-shirts and flashing bunny ears take on the challenge of a six or thirteen mile overnight walk for Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity's Midnight Walk.

More than 50% of the marshalling team were freemasons from Buckingham, Concordia, De Bohun, Fairway, Ferdinand De Rothschild, Haddenham, Pegasus, Vale and Wendover Lodges, as well as St Mary's Lodge, Oxfordshire.

"This was a magical night and we are so grateful to all the Midnight Walkers for participating and creating such a wonderful atmosphere," said Jo Turner, Head of Fundraising at Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity. "A fantastic £55,000 has been raised to help us provide care to patients."

Cat Jelly, a Staff Nurse at the Hospice, helped to register the walkers and commented: "I would just like to say a huge thank you to all the amazing people who did the walk and who helped out."

Lee Buckingham, Charity Steward at Haddenham Lodge, who took over from Graham Dearing as coordinator for the marshalling team, said: "The Florence Nightingale Hospice does such wonderful work and we have supported them for many years. It was great to see so many ladies out there raising funds and we were really pleased to be able to assist them and ensure they had safe conditions for their walk. 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Support for counselling charity and hospice

Relate Mid Thames & Buckinghamshire, the relationship charity, recently received more than £1,000 through the Heart of Bucks Foundation for the purchase of a new computer and some phone compatible headsets for use by their counsellors and appointments team.

The charity has offices throughout Buckinghamshire and East Berkshire. It is a member of the national Relate Federation but is entirely independent, relying on its own fundraising to provide professional counselling to local people regardless of their ability to pay, through its Bursary Funding Scheme.

Relate is now much more than a marriage guidance organisation. It supports more than 1,000 people in the local area each year, on matters such as depression, cancer (in association with Macmillan nurses), mental health issues and all types of relationship problems (including loneliness).

Andrew Hough, secretary of the BMCF, commented: "Relate does extremely necessary and important work throughout our area and we are very pleased to be able to help them with this donation."

Fiona Greenfield, the Centre Director of Relate Mid Thames & Buckinghamshire said: "We would like to thank Buckinghamshire freemasons for this very generous donation. Our appointments team and counsellors work extremely hard for our clients and having the use of a modern headset to talk will leave them able to take notes while taking calls from clients."

Eye care

Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon, Asifa Shaikh, recently received a donation of £2,500 on behalf of Buckinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust, towards research into the effects and treatment of glaucoma.

The money was raised during John Hubble's year as Master of De Bohun Lodge which meets at the Aylesbury Masonic Centre.

John's wife Doreen has suffered with glaucoma for a long time and was full of praise for Miss Shaikh and her team. She said: "Asifa has been wonderful in helping me with my condition and I'm really pleased

Medical Detection Dogs update

De Bohun Lodge has donated £2,500 to Medical Detection Dogs (MDD), in addition to a grant of £15,000 from the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF).

Daniel Howard OBE, Chief Operating Officer of the Milton Keynes-based charity, said: "We are extremely grateful for these most generous donations. We are all incredibly aware of the Freemasons' role in helping us."

Malaria detection dogs

MDD has also received a Grand Challenges Explorations Grant for ground-breaking research in global health and development, an initiative funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, for a project entitled *Using medical-detection dogs to identify people with malaria parasites*.

Parkinson's Disease Detection

One of the charity's newest projects is looking at whether the MDD dogs can detect

early stage Parkinson's disease. The charity is working with Manchester University to conduct a two year study, funded by Parkinson's UK and The Michael J Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Research.

As there is currently no definitive test for the condition, it is hoped that this research will be able to help detect this disease earlier.

MDD CEO, Dr Claire Guest, said: "Parkinson's is pernicious and to be able to extend the quality of life for those affected would be a highly significant step forward."

Exhibition display

MDD also approached Paul French to see if he could help with funds for a pop up exhibition display stand that could be used at fund raising events in the Lecture Theatre at MDD HQ as well as at other venues.

Paul approached some of the lodges based at the Eliot Hall in Winslow and they combined to provide a cheque for £700 to pay for the new display.

Three Peaks challenge

The first mountain was Ben Nevis (1345m/4413ft), a tough climb with freezing sleet mixed with heavy rain and a 30mph wind.

Not many climbers reached the top but Martin made it in five hours. The heavy rain continued, making it slow progress to the

summit of Snowdon (1085m/3560ft).

The organisers pulled the plug on Scafell Pike (978m/3210ft) as there was not enough time to complete the climb but Martin reached this peak on 22nd July, commenting: "It was well

worth the effort. I kept true to myself and reached all three peaks, completing the challenge in full. Would I do it again? Yes I would!"

All in all, it was an epic climb with little sleep but Martin raised £525 for this year's Master's Charity Crohn's & Colitis UK.

Ride for MS



Members of Denham and Observatory Lodges have raised a total of £530 for the Multiple Sclerosis (MS) Society on behalf of keen cyclist Ben Hames, son of Observatory Lodge member Steve Howes' partner Amanda.

"Doing the RideLondon 100 mile challenge was my way of saying thanks for supporting my mum, who suffers from MS," said Ben.

Ben is doing an advanced apprenticeship as a mechanical technician and, instead of just achieving his BTEC, he will go on to complete an HNC in engineering. On top of all of this, he is also completing an NVQ. He said; "Being mechanically minded, I carry out all the maintenance and servicing on my bicycles and car myself."

HELPING YOUNGSTERS IN THE COMMUNITY

Safety equipment helps youngsters at ALF

The Adventure Learning Foundation (ALF) operates activity villages throughout the Home Counties, including the beautiful Green Park estate in Aston Clinton.

They recently identified the need for some replacement safety equipment at their adventure centre, especially for use on the 10 metre high climbing wall which is very popular, especially with families, schools and those booking birthday parties or activity days. The equipment is essential for the centre staff to run these activities in a safe and secure manner for the youngsters.

Heidi Nugent, Development Advisor for ALF, approached Andrew Hough, secretary of the BMCF, and the committee was extremely pleased to authorise nearly £4,000 for the purchase of a range of safety equipment. This included helmets, ropes, belay devices and, most importantly, a trunk and posture support harness for use by people with posture and mobility disabilities which preclude them from being able to support their own weight when climbing.

Students visit zoo

Year 6 pupils from Cippenham School in Slough recently enjoyed an end of term day out at Whipsnade Zoo thanks to Old Paludians Lodge, a former Grammar School Lodge which meets at the Slough Masonic Centre.

At £3,000 it was a big ask for Old Paludians to fund the whole trip so Bob Cole, lodge secretary, approached Andrew Hough, Chairman of the BMCF, which donated half the cost; the lodge members funded the rest.

The children had a wonderful time as can be seen from a letter from one of them: "Dear Freemasons, this has been wonderful trip and a fantastic experience. We had an amazing time. It was a trip that we will never forget. On behalf of Year 6 I would like to say ... Thank You!"

Jonathon Boulton, Activities Manager at Green Park, said: "We are so grateful to Bucks' Freemasons for this grant as it enables us to take our youngsters onto the climbing walls and other equipment in complete safety. The posture harness is particularly useful as it allows many of those who are wheelchairbound to experience the same fun as those who are able to climb without assistance."

Steve Smirthwaite, who is on the BMCF committee, recently attended an I Ith birthday party for Poppy and her pals and was able to see the equipment in use.

Steve said: "We at the BMCF are especially pleased when we can give grants to those groups which provide support and services to the younger members of our society."

Longridge has a state-of-the-art 13 metre, two sided climbing wall which also incorporates the Leap of Faith and Jacob's Ladder. All of the activities encourage groups to work together, as these activities often take people outside their comfort zone.

At a recent activity evening, a group of year 6 pupils from Stokenchurch Primary School were given a taste of how to work as a team whilst using some of the safety equipment provided by Bucks' Freemasons.

All the fun of the fair at Windsor

On 24th June 1717, four London Masonic Lodges met at the Goose and Gridiron Tavern near St Paul's Cathedral and formed the first Grand Lodge of England.

From Festival Chairman Graham Dearing

Festival update



Welcome to the fourth edition of Festival Focus.

We are now a year into the Festival and, in that time, have made great progress in ensuring that every lodge is fully engaged in raising much needed funds for the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

I never miss an opportunity to remind everyone that, when raising money for the MCF, we in Bucks have received over £2.75m of support for our members and charities in the past eleven years. Freemasons in Buckinghamshire and their dependants get valuable support when in need from the MCF and it with this in mind that I ask everyone (if their circumstances permit) to support our Festival.

I am always mindful that not every lodge can give large donations; there will always be smaller lodges that cannot achieve big totals. However, the really positive thing is that every lodge is doing something and supporting this wonderful Province and its members.

I enjoy sharing information with everyone, so for those who like facts and figures here we go:

- Currently only 20% of Bucks freemasons have a regular donation set up for the Festival Relief Chest.
- 10% of members have made a lump sum payment directly to the Festival Relief Chest.
- Potentially 70% of the Province is yet to actively participate. (There will be a number of members who will be donating to their own lodge's relief chest with a view to this being transferred later in the Festival.)
- Over 55% of lodges and their members have already donated or pledged over £5,000.
- Ten lodges have already donated over or pledged over £15,000 and one lodge is now over £25,000.
- Every year, Buckinghamshire Freemasons and charities receive approximately £250,000 in support from the now newly formed Masonic Charitable Foundation.
- If every lodge between now and Christmas got five members to donate £10 per

month (that's one cup of coffee per week) until the end of the Festival, with gift aid that would raise £348,000 further towards our Festival total.

We currently have pledged and donated a total £806,000 to our 2021 Festival. Whilst this is a lot of money and looks like we are doing very well, there are still four years until the end of our Festival. However – and it is a big however – the issue is that this figure not only takes into account all actual donations into the Festival Relief Chest but all regular donations (ie monthly payments) which are pledged over the next four years but have not yet been paid.

There are lodges that have been collecting donations for the Festival via their own Relief Chests, and for that a massive thank you. I would, however, ask that you consider transferring the money over in a timely manner and not wait until the end of the Festival.

If you haven't any charity in your heart, you have the worst kind of heart trouble.

You may want to consider attending the Provincial cheque presentation night which will be held in March 2018 to hand over any lodge donation. It will be a wonderful opportunity to support our new PGM, John Clark, who, as you all know (and hopefully have in your diary), will be invested on 9th February at Great Queen Street, something not to miss! The date and venue for the next cheque presentation will be with you soon.

To every lodge and every freemason who has donated or is in the process of doing so I say a huge thank you.

If your lodge is holding an event for the Festival, or if you are undertaking a sponsored event, please let either me or our new Charity Steward, Mike Clanfield, know. Whilst we cannot advertise it across the whole of the Province, we would be able to help you promote it in your area. We will also try to attend as many functions as possible and supply information and display material to help support your event.

If you have an idea for an event and are not quite sure how to go about it, or if you just want to help us with our events, again, please contact us and we can help talk you through it.

£58k community awards

Six local charities have benefited from a series of special Community Awards following an unprecedented public vote of nearly 179,000 people across England and Wales.

The Community Awards are a major part of the 300^{th} anniversary celebrations with the Masonic Charitable Foundation distributing £3million to 300 charities across the country. The public vote decided the range of awards from £4,000 to £25,000.

Thanks go out to all the casters, who are so good with the youngsters, and to the ladies who served up an excellent barbecue lunch. Without their support these events just could not happen.

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
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IG's Forum

At the meeting of the Buckinghamshire Higher Degrees Chapter Rose Croix at Bletchley on 1st November, Very Illustrious Bro Peter Harborne 33° held his Inspector General's Forum at the end of his first year in office.

Amongst various aspects of the Perfection ceremony and the Chapter proceedings which he discussed, he referred to the Ist and 2nd Generals now being permitted to confer the Intermediate Degrees and to explain the collar and signs (which had previously been the preserve of sovereigns only).

He congratulated Harry Hunter and Bill Thomes on their running of the Beaconsfield Chapter of Instruction which was improving the standard of ritual delivery in the South of the District and hoped that a similar scheme would be set up further north in due course.

Additionally, the lodge provided a shed to store the children's toys.

NEWS IN BRIEF

PSA testing

Over I 30 freemasons and friends from Bucks lodges attended a PSA testing session at Bletchley in August.

Since mid-July 2014, the Graham Fulford Trust, which has been organising these free tests, has tested in excess of 5,300 freemasons who have attended the sessions from around the country.

In Buckinghamshire, over 900 men have been tested. Up to the beginning of 2017, some thirteen have had a prostate cancer diagnosis confirmed. Most had no symptoms and have made a good recovery.

PDPGM, Mike Stimson, said, "Early and regular testing is vital for this disease which is one of the leading killers of men. I am so pleased with the numbers who are regularly getting tested. It is good for our joint futures and we must continue to carry them out.

It is also good to see the Graham Fulford Trust working with the Medical Detection Dogs on a two year trial with Milton Keynes University Hospital as a way of improving the detection rate. It is amazing to see these two great charities working towards the same end."

Lodge ritual

Buckingham Lodge has always been known for its unique working of the ritual.

In its 165 year history this has never been published but passed on orally, although many brethren do make notes in an Emulation Book of the variances.

The Lodge of Instruction (which itself was inaugurated in 1883) has now sponsored the publication of the definitive version. This was made available at the Installation meeting, or Convention, in October which was the 1,300th Convention of the Lodge.

The Future of the Craft – the IDG speaks

Notarius Lodge recently hosted the second in a series of talks regarding the future of Freemasonry. The guest speaker was Third Grand Principal and RW Provincial Grand Master for South Wales, ME Companion Gareth Jones.



As Deputy Chairman

of the IDG (Improvement Development Group) at Grand Lodge, he entitled his talk Delivering the Future of the Craft and Royal Arch.

He spoke about the emergence of the IDG in 2016 from the original Membership Focus Group, then under the Chairmanship of Ray Reed, which is now tasked with securing the future of Freemasonry.

Gareth said that one of the issues was with quality and that lodges needed to get away from the "It'll do" culture and that lodges should not be afraid to say no to a candidate, perhaps referring him to another, more suitable, lodge. He also advised that the focus should be on Quality Ritual.

He spoke about the image of Freemasonry and its relevance to the community; the virtual learning environment; the need for accountability in decisions taken; the importance of Orators and delivering orations within ceremonies; and especially the need to expand Lodges of Instruction to include a real educational element rather than just practice ceremonies.

Gareth Jones, Deputy Chairman of the IDG, during his talk on the future of the Craft and Royal Arch

Gareth also spoke about the Royal Arch which had an overall conversion rate of 40%, although this was only 35% in Bucks.

Grand Lodge intended

to publish a strategy document which would set out guidance for all lodges (and members) to follow. His message was that continuous improvement has to be the order of the day.

Gareth's talk was, in every respect, a very positive and thought-provoking session, heavily slanted towards a question and answer format.

Notarius Lodge's membership is drawn from Secretaries and Scribes E within the Province, both present and past. It acts as a conduit for the exchange of information between the Secretaries and the Provincial Executive and aims to be the Centre of Excellence for this most important of offices.

Notarius meets twice a year, in January and September, keeping its ritual to the minimum and always providing a speaker on matters of relevance to Freemasonry in the modern world. It is expected that, at the January 2018 meeting, PGM-designate, John Clark, will talk about his strategy and vision for his time in charge of this great Province.
