

Finders, keepers!

Many organisations of all types suffer from falling numbers from time to time and Freemasonry is not immune to this.

With this in mind, in early 2016 the Provincial Team appointed Peter Kemp as Provincial Membership Officer to stabilise and then grow membership.

A Provincial Membership Strategy Group was formed consisting of brethren from the five main centres. Their main aims were to:

- Coordinate on-line enquiries and reach out to possible interested people.
- Develop lodge membership focus groups to interact with the local communities by displaying at shows and events.
- Create a lodge history guide and 'Introduction to your lodge: how would you tell a prospective candidate why they should join your lodge?'.
- Create a Planning the Lodge Future guide that steers the lodge in understanding the dynamics of future membership numbers and actions to take.
- Create a social media template which each lodge can adapt and expand. Does it work? Yes it does! (See case study above.)
- Develop YouTube videos: there is a web designer and an international film director on the team.
- Develop easy to learn ritual techniques to help members learn comfortably without the angst.

Case Study

In 2014, Marlow Bridge Lodge launched the first version of its own website, www.marlowbridgelodge.co.uk.

Over time, the lodge has seen a slow but steady increase in the number of visits to the site which has resulted in a joining member return to freemasonry after a twenty year gap and a new member who was recently initiated.

Using social media effectively

John Waller of St Giles Lodge started a Twitter link that put the Bletchley Centre on the map.

It now has over 1,500 followers from all over the world who now know more about freemasonry.

St Giles Lodge also uses WhatsApp for arranging Lodge of Instruction meetings: a quick method of spreading the word.

• Identify lodges that require help and assistance with rejuvenation and retention schemes which could attract an expanding membership by possibly becoming a special interest themed lodge, eg motorcycle, classic car, ritual excellence (Old School House Lodge), sports, hobbies and many others.

Please let Peter know your lodge special interest or if you wish to form a new lodge as candidates constantly come along who could be interested. For example, Industria Lodge has a number of musicians who would like to form a Silver Band.

 Form a Membership Focus Group at each centre to share ideas and help with the online recruitment and retention for lodges meeting at that centre.

Willing volunteers are needed with energy and drive to help: there is no requirement for seniority. Can **you** help?

2017 promises to be a great year for membership enquiries and we need to be ready to manage the interest and gain from the opportunity of 300 years. We owe freemasonry our effort to ensure we make the next 100 years as successful as our past brethren have done for us.

Practical help

Founded in 1967, Buckingham Pre-School Playgroup (BPSP) takes in children between two and four years of age and guides them through the Early Years Foundation Stage of their development, providing them with a caring and safe environment to interact with other children and adults.

The playgroup identified a need for an Interactive Board for use by the children. These are invaluable in helping youngsters develop their phonic, numeracy and literacy skills, as well as being an excellent way of introducing them to technology and enhancing their motor and coordination

Jamie Robinson, a member of Wineslai Lodge, whose daughter Gracie attends the school, contacted the Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund on behalf of Karen Clarke, the BPSP Play Leader; the BMCF was delighted to allocate the £2,000 needed.

Not only that: David Lowey, Managing Director of Interactive Installs in Milton Keynes - whose daughter, coincidentally, had also attended the Playgroup - ensured that his company covered the costs. Once installed, lamie constructed a cabinet to protect the screen when not in use.

Karen said: "We are absolutely delighted to have this piece of modern technology for use by our children. In the short time it has been in place, the children absolutely love the way they can interact with some of their favourite characters and, of course, they are learning at a much quicker pace than some of the traditional methods of numeracy and literacy teaching. We would like to thank the BMCF for their generous donation and David

Lowey and Jamie Robinson for making it all happen."

Steve Smirthwaite added: "With two grandsons under five I am particularly aware of the need for youngsters to gain as much confidence with technology as they can. For them to be learning their basic life skills

Founded in 1987 by a group of parents in Milton Keynes to help one another, VICTA supports children, young adults and their families across the UK and aims to be the little charity with the biggest impact.

One young person summed up perfectly what the charity sets out to achieve: "VICTA has certainly helped me develop as a person. My family was very quick to notice how much more confidence I have gained, how willing I am to say yes and give something a

go rather than back down, how my level of independence has developed and how far I've come since being in an isolated world after going totally blind.'

Andrew Hough, Secretary of the BMCF, said: "We were delighted to help with this wonderful project. We hope that the sailing goes extremely well and that all those involved have a wonderful experience."

The charity's main goal is to help people gain greater control over their MS so that they continue to lead happy and healthy lives.

The centre provides comprehensive and holistic care, including physiotherapy, hydrotherapy, oxygen therapy, acupuncture and massage, to over 330 people each week.

A need was recently identified for a specialist wheelchair-adapted exercise bike

for use by the many local people with MS who need physiotherapy. This type of bike costs more than £2,500 and needs a physiotherapist to supervise those using it. Grenville Lodge donated this amount towards the overall cost and Andrew Hough, secretary of the BMCF, organised a donation that covered the full purchase cost, leaving the lodge donation to be used for running and maintaining the bike.

All are welcome to assist whether a Grand Officer or an Entered Apprentice and everyone gains from promoting the Province to both existing and potential


members. You would not be expected to remain all day but any help, even just setting up or taking down, is always very gratefully received.

I am sure everyone is aware that the 2021 Festival was launched by the Provincial Grand Master, Gordon Robertson, at the Provincial Meeting last October. A cheque for £200,000 was handed over by the PGM to the President of the Masonic Charitable Foundation, Richard Hone QC, to help kick start the Festival. It was a great beginning to the Festival and something we should all be very proud of.

It is very encouraging to know that, whichever lodge any member of the Executive or Visiting Provincial Officers goes to, the Festival is being discussed. Charity Stewards are encouraging members to start regular donations using gift aid; proposals are being made and carried to donate monies from lodge relief chests to the Festival; and gift aid envelopes are being used to collect alms to assist in raising extra funds.

I cannot tell you how good it is to know that we, as a Province, are so fully supportive of the Festival. As it does not finish until October 2021, we have a long way to go. However, as long as we make it fun and enjoyable and understand why we are raising the money and how it it is being applied, we will succeed.

We are starting to get the first full sets of reports from the Buckinghamshire Festival Relief Chest and I am pleased to announce that currently over 80% of all Bucks lodges have already donated or have brethren pledging regular donations. 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Mentoring Best Practice

With a complete set of documentation available for lodge mentors, new members and personal mentors, the Provincial Mentoring programme was launched in February with a series of seminars at five centres. Moving forward, Best Mentoring Practice will be featured within lodges and centres throughout the Province in the coming months.

Freemasons who meet at the Eliot Hall centre in Winslow started the process, with a mentoring team being formed during a Conference in Aylesbury.

Following a presentation by James Blackhurst about the North East Corner Club (NECC), several mentors from different lodges based at Eliot Hall suggested forming a Saturday Morning Club (SMC), complementing the NECC. The SMC is made up not only of mentors based at Eliot Hall but others who will help to educate newer members with regard to masonic knowledge.

Eliot Hall has hosted several of these meetings and all masons who live within travelling distance are invited to attend; this includes members of neighbouring Provinces. The objective is to encourage mentoring for all.

Whilst many of the topics covered at these gatherings are aimed at newer brethren, some more experienced masons have commented that they have also advanced their masonic knowledge.

Topics covered so far have been the Festive Board, etiquette and visiting officers. The last meeting covered the first degree, with pauses for commentary on what had taken place.

Future topics include: the Formation of UGLE, the history of masonry in Winslow and 'What is the BOC?'. The subject matter is taken from three sources: the Provincial mentoring plan, which forms the basis of the SMC; subjects requested by attendees; and guest presentations.

The SMC provides a safe environment that lends itself to a relaxed discussion of topics, as well as the essential Q&A sessions

It also enables more experienced brethren to be involved in passing on their knowledge. The mentoring documents are discussed and prime areas of interest for a new brother agreed. Subjects covered are varied and include such things as salutes, etiquette, the wearing of gloves, jewels and anything highlighted in a mentoring plan.

Much of this is backed up with information from the UGLE mentoring website which has a vast amount of information available and helps prove that there is rarely one correct answer to anything masonic.

Some of the ideas brought forward from the meetings are: after each degree the candidate receives information on that ceremony; the questions for the next degree; and the mentoring plan for the next stage.

It has been proposed that specific mentoring nights are allocated to introduce newer brethren into the Lol system of their lodge as early as possible.

At a meeting/ceremony when a brother has to leave the lodge for some time, it is recommended the lodge mentor or a senior mason goes with them and material is provided for them to discuss whilst outside.

It is also beneficial to involve new brethren in organising dining. This introduces them to all their lodge members in a short space of time. Also, being seated with different lodge officers at the Festive Board helps gain an understanding of the different roles.

All this may not work for everyone but appears to be working for those using Eliot Hall.

The United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) has issued a licence for Buckinghamshire Provincial Grand Lodge to hold Webinars, short for web-based seminar.

This is an exciting development in terms of reaching our members, often in their own home, via computer access.

Many of you will have experienced a video conference call, Facetime, Skype or other

webcam-type interaction. The Webinar has developed into a popular tool across businesses and public service bodies and we are very fortunate that we are now included in this effective method of communication.

It is now being rolled out by the Provincial Mentor, Almoner and Charity Steward and it is expected many others will take advantage of it. Buckinghamshire Provincial Royal Arch Chapter has also started to use the Webinar in the same way.

A Webinar can be a powerful training and outreach tool. When determining whether it is the best medium for our needs, the following should be considered:

The audience:

- There's a a large physical area to cover in this Province
- Webinar will give big savings by reducing travel costs and time
- It will allow training and information to be delivered from a central point (even from home)
- It will enable connection with a wide audience across the Province
- The tool is easy and intuitive to use (but training will be required)
- No special hardware is needed

The subject matter:

- The audience can range from one to 100, so different groups can be targetted
- The tool will run on different devices so that even those who only have an iPad can attend
- Everyone is becoming more proficient in the use of Power Point to enhance the topics
- More than one speaker can address the audience and show documents, slides, forms etc.
- The keyboard and mouse of any participant can be taken over by the presenter to help

Time:

- The time needed to cover a topic can vary
- Most online audiences tend to lose interest after about two hours (or less)
- The licence allows any length of seminar and any number (but not two simultaneously)
- The entire Webinar can be recorded, including audience participation, and shown again, reducing the need to produce

copious notes

- Any participant can 'raise their hand' and everyone can comment at will under the moderation of the organiser
- While Webinars work well for some topics, they're not suited to every training need

on the outskirts of St George's, a typical Caribbean port.


After a sightseeing tour of the local area they went to the local rum factory for a little tasting, followed by lunch at a nearby club, before returning to the ship.
