




Please try to introduce at least one candidate into every lodge each year and work hard to find suitable, kind individuals, who would enjoy this wonderful organisation.



Each issue, one of the Provincial Executive will update us on provincial activities that are their responsibility.



With the assistance of W.Bro. Eugene Matthias as the then Provincial Mentor and W.Bro. John King heading up the North East Corner Club, in the Spring of 2018 the Pathway Steps were demonstrated at every major Centre in the Province as a guide to help Lodges attract, introduce and retain members. In most cases, this structured approach for Lodges to follow has been most successful but it is still very much 'work in progress'.


The Provincial Mentoring & Pathway Team, the North East Corner Club, the Bucks Masonic Wanderers, the Provincial Stewards, the Ritual Support Team and the Orators Team all work closely together to support every Lodge that may be encountering difficulties with sustaining a sufficient membership and carrying out any one of the three Ceremonies and an Installation meeting.

To add value to this support, I have recently been tasked with the administration of the Visiting Officers Scheme. A Visiting Officer's key objectives are to encourage

Recruitment, Reduce Resignations, Promote the Royal Arch and encourage attendance at the Provincial Grand Lodge meeting in October and to evaluate and implement any assistance that a Lodge may require. To enable them to inaugurate Provincial Support, the Visiting Officers file detailed reports via Helipad and the ten Senior Visiting Officers and I are made aware if a Lodge is encountering any problems.

To assist the Visiting Officers to inform Lodges of the Provincial support available, a Visiting Officers Handbook has been produced and is available in both printed and pdf form. Currently, not every Lodge in the Province has been allocated a VO. If you are a Past Provincial Officer and a member of the Royal Arch and would like to support the Province by acting as a VO, please contact me by email: pblacklaw@buckspgl.org

I also work closely with the Provincial Almoner, W.Bro. Stephen Knight, who has encouraged Lodges to be aware of any of their members who may be experiencing health and mobility issues which may prevent them from attending their Lodge meetings. Stephen and his area assistants endeavour to identify these members and liaise with Lodge Almoners to organise transport to and from meetings. This is a most important



service to assist long serving members attend their Lodges and maintain their fraternal friendship with Brethren they may have known for many years. If you can be of any assistance to such a member of your Lodge, please approach your Lodge Almoner and volunteer your interest.

The culmination of the MCF 2021 Festival is now only some eighteen months away and I take this opportunity to encourage all the Lodges to support the Festival as much as they possibly can. The MCF gives tremendous support to our members and their families who have experienced unexpected life changing circumstances whether it is bereavement, terminal illness, debilitating condition, redundancy etc. In my six years as Provincial Almoner, I witnessed first-hand the vital and essential support given to Bucks Masons and their dependants in times of extreme distress and anxiety.

Please support the MCF Festival, perhaps one day you or your extended family may call on its support due to unforeseen circumstances, you just never know.

The evening's food and in some cases transport were funded by the members of the lodge, who sponsor a retired or serving HMF guest and we had 19 HMF visitors in attendance.

A lively festive board was enjoyed. Afterwards, the Port from the unknown soldier was dispensed by 2 Brethren to those who wished to partake, the carafe returned to his table...stopper left off.

After a good old fashioned sing song, Bro Peter Goodwin delivered an explanation of how the 'Unknown Soldier' came to fruition. Bro Sgt Russ Barber demonstrated Rifle drill for us all to watch in awe, all in front of the Unknown Soldier,

Reg said he last wore his beret 70 years ago but it was the first time that he felt that anyone genuinely was saying thank you to him. He also said he had become a bit of a recluse but was so glad he didn't cancel as he really enjoyed himself...

followed by a rousing round of applause and lumps in throats. After more singing, W.Bro Lee Buckingham took his stance behind the Unknown Soldiers table, where the Last Post followed by silence and completed by Reveille was played live, which again was met with applause and tears.

This is our second event for HMF appreciation, which started to mark the Centenary of 1914-1918 and will not be our last. We now have a new tradition.

Sue Simms, liaison for the 'Blind Vets Association' said "I wanted to pass on a huge thank you for organising for the Blind Veterans to attend the meal on Saturday evening. 

Buckinghamshire launches new **Acting Provincial Grand Officers** Lodge


BUCKS MOTORCYCLE LODGE



found a new congregation to worship with in Hemel Hempstead. The congregation welcomed me in, with the help of my brother who was already a member.

Being part of a Church group gives me a real sense of purpose. On a Friday evening, around 7.30pm, I set off from my home in Dunstable to work with the homeless. Over the years, many things have changed. People have been moved on in an attempt to hide this problem. Some are in housing but others are not so lucky. I have been fortunate enough to get to know some of them quite well and to be able to help them with their needs of clothing, food and bedding and sometimes just to be there to listen.

Every Friday for the last 15 years, a group of us take a minibus from the church in Watford. We often receive specific requests from those we help, and we bag and label these prior to going out. Men's shoes, socks, underwear and jackets/coats are always in short supply, along with toiletries We load up with the sandwiches, tea, coffee and soup and a giant urn of hot water. The sandwiches are made every week by the ladies of the Church.

We set off after a prayer and make two stops which alternate each week. The first stop is Lincoln's Inn Fields, which is just at the end of the road where Grand Lodge sits. The second is just over Waterloo bridge under the railway arches.

On arrival at the locations, there could be up to 30 to 40 people on the streets waiting for us. One thing I have noticed is that rain, cold sleet and snow makes no difference to whether they will be there. We open the rear of the bus and set up tables to put the tea and coffee making facilities on. We spend time talking to them, seeing how they are and make

team the next week to look into.

At the time I started this, Freemasonry was not even an idea in my mind, I was doing this because it was the right thing to do. I had only met Freemasons once, my father-in-law at the time was a Freemason in Zimbabwe (Rhodesia at the time) and had friends and family in the UK who were members. I was lucky enough to attend a Ladies festival at the Café Royal in London and see and hear a lot of what they did. I eventually joined in 2010 and have never looked back.

To me, being a Freemason allows me to actively participate in my Christianity as well as allowing me to help more people, both locally and further afield, by having fun and working hard with the other members of our fraternity.

Making the decision to become a Freemason is one the best things I ever did. Having a group of real friends who really want you to be the best person you can be and actively want to help you achieve that. It has given me more confidence in speaking to others and, as an adult teacher in my church bible class, it has brought my abilities to speak in front of others to a new level.

Florence Nightingale 30th Celebration



On 16th October 2019, sixteen Buckinghamshire Freemasons along with their partners and friends were invited to a private evening at Waddesdon Manor by Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity in celebration of their 30th anniversary and to give thanks for all that Buckinghamshire Freemasons do for their charity by way of fundraising, donations and volunteering.

They were greeted by the hospice team and led up the lovely drive to the house where they were met by a team of Manor curators, and treated to a private tour. The tour ended with an overview of Ferdinand de Rothschild, who was a Freemason.

This masonic lodge in his name was established in Aylesbury in 1892. Its consecration took place at the Five Arrows Hotel, Waddesdon on 30th May 1892. Its name is derived from Baron Ferdinand who it was intended should be the first Master. However, at the time he was in France and was taken ill and was unable to be

present. He was subsequently installed as second Master in June 1893. The initiation fee was seven guineas, joining fee three guineas and annual subscription three guineas.

The Manor was built in the 1870s to house the Rothschild's global collection. A purpose-built Victorian manor of extreme opulence, with rooms specifically sized, designed & decorated to hold specific items. Very eclectic, but everything of the highest possible standard and quality.

During the tour, two statues caught their eye and they pointed them out to the curators. From the photographs taken you will see why. Once the tour had concluded, they were led down to the world-renowned Rothschild Wine Cellars.

Mark Duncan of Ferdinand de Rothschild 2420 lodge gave a lovely speech on what we as Freemasons do, and linking it all in with what Florence Nightingale Hospice does. Jo Turner, the current CEO of the hospice gave a wonderful speech of thanks and explained the importance of Freemasons help - both financially and volunteering wise - also giving an overview of what the charity does, and is planning.

They were then treated to a very detailed wine tasting session with the estate wine sommelier explaining the provenance of the wines we were tasting and a history lesson on the Rothschild's global vineyards and wine varieties. The evening was very personal and enjoyable, for which they were all very grateful for being invited to be part of a truly memorable event.

One key strategy of the Provincial executive is to make Freemasonry in Buckinghamshire as inclusive as possible and to involve partners and non-masons wherever feasible.

The Provincial Grand Lodge meeting in October was a prime example of this and all of those attending witnessed another grand day in Great Queen Street. This year a two-part day was organised to accommodate the Provincial business meeting and to allow family, friends and visitors to witness the ceremony of those individuals and lodges receiving appointments, promotions and special awards.

Preparation and planning commenced soon after the 2018 meeting. There are many aspects that need to be addressed for a Provincial Grand Lodge meeting, especially when it is held in Grand Lodge. Logistically, having a two-part day created a further challenge. Programmes, Show Team equipment and a host of other essential items needed to be transported to Grand Lodge prior to the event. Practice sessions for the two meetings have to be undertaken to ensure the ceremonial delivery meets the high standard Buckinghamshire has set for itself; those involved were required to be on site early in the day to enable practice to occur either side of the formal business meeting.

Administratively a PGL meeting creates a huge task for the Provincial Office team. Agendas, creating programmes, seating arrangements in the Lodge, details of processions, dining arrangements and table plans are just some of the tasks; although most of us enjoy a smooth-running day the effort to deliver all of these organisational tasks is enormous.

The other essential ingredient for success is the large team of volunteers who provide ceremonial assistance, working parties and guides. The various teams from Stewards lodge and Addington, and other stalwart Provincial supporters provided effective cover on the day.

Secretaries' New Year Conference

They enjoyed presentations from Hugh Douglas-Smith (A&Ps and HeliPAD), Phil Blacklaw (Working with your Lodge VO), John King (Working with your Lodge Mentor), Stuart McCurry (the role of the ProvGSuptWks in supporting Masonic Meeting Places) and Derrick Ardron (introducing Damian Waite and Provincial Office processes). Each presentation was well received with a short Q&A session after each.

The over-arching message from the Conference was the importance of the accuracy of the information on our members stored by UGLE. Accurate and up to date information on Lodge members will greatly assist Lodge Secretaries in their administration of their Lodge and also assist Lodge Mentors, Almoners and VOs in their roles.

The Conference was concluded with a light hearted, but never the less intriguing, quiz on some of the less well known rules of the Book of Constitution

Appointments & Promotions (A&Ps)

As we progress through Freemasonry the colour and size of our aprons and collars change. As an Entered Apprentice the array and diversity of aprons around the room can seem spectacular as well as somewhat confusing. From the light blue rosetted apron of a Master Mason, through the barred version of a Master or Past Master to the dark blue of a Provincial or District Grand Officer, the range of central badges and their symbols can take a while to understand.

What, however, appears to be more steeped in secrecy, legend, rumour and mystique is the tales of how the individuals came by those badges. This article sets out to dispel some of the myths and bring some transparency to the process.

Each year the Provincial Grand Lodge of Buckinghamshire like other Provinces awards individual brethren with what are known as 'honours'. These are designed to recognise the work and effort that a Brother has put in to both their Lodge, the Province and the wider community. At the start of each year each Lodge decides on the Brothers to be put forward for consideration and an application is filled out by the Lodge secretary. There are rules as to who is eligible to be put forward. Basically, for a first appointment, a Brother becomes eligible 6 years after being installed into the Master's Chair. Then five years after an appointment he becomes eligible for a first promotion and five years after that for a second promotion.

Like most things, there are some exceptions. It is possible to receive an appointment without going through the chair. The principals applied are that the Brother in question has provided sterling support for his Lodge as well as Masonry or his community. Typically, to even out the timescale of working through the offices and the Chair, a Brother who has not been through the Chair would expect to have served around 14 years before being put forward. The other exception is the annual

appointment of Provincial Stewards who are entitled to wear the red Stewards' aprons. These are typically appointed early (around a year out of the Chair) and are selected by the Provincial Grand Master and his executive for the work they are doing in both their individual Lodges and the Province in general.

The application process and awards are done on a very objective basis with Lodges putting forward an application which describes the work of the Brother in question. These applications are then scored and rated within the batch of applications for that year before being scrutinised by the Provincial Executive. Each year the scoring system varies to match the objectives and strategy of the Province. In the last couple of years a large emphasis has been put on the Royal Arch and whether the Brother in question is a subscribing member. In addition, the key focus of the current executive is Membership so attention is given to whether the Brother has been active in recruiting new members for his Lodge.

Sometime in the second quarter of the year, the offer letters of Appointment and Promotion are sent out. These need to be replied to in order to accept the offer which is then conferred at the Provincial meeting in October. It has always been a tradition that as many recipients as possible attend the meeting to receive their honours.

Buckinghamshire Provincial Charitable Activities

Mike Clanfield - Provincial Grand Charity Steward reports on Buckinghamshire Provincial Charitable Activities.

As you are all no doubt aware, Buckinghamshire is approaching the final stretch of the 2021 Festival in aid of the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) and our Province continues to excel in all aspects of charitable giving. The Festival has received over £1.4 million already and Charities in Buckinghamshire have benefitted from grants from the MCF from these donations.

The Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund (BMCF) has also made many grants to Buckinghamshire charities and will continue to do so. Details of some of these grants are highlighted elsewhere


in this issue of Concord.

Each year, the MCF supports around 5,000 freemasons and their families with grants and services totalling more than £15 million. It also supports around 500 additional charities in all communities with an additional fund of £5 million.

Uniquely, the MCF have entered into partnerships with leading charities. These include Age UK, Hospice UK and now Home-Start UK. The massive advantage of this initiative is the increased efficacy of the money

given. These large charities already have infrastructure, resources and an intimate knowledge of the needs of their beneficiaries.

Last year, the MCF supported Buckinghamshire Freemasons and their families with 82 grants – that's almost one for every lodge in the province. These grants totalled more than £130,000. These grants are helping families who are struggling to make ends meet. They are encouraging greater independence for people with disabilities, and giving young people the opportunity to succeed in their education. They



also providing high-quality care and medical treatment for older, disabled or seriously ill people. On top of all that, hospices, the air ambulance, and other local charities in this province received grants totalling more than £70,000.

Freemasons across the country alongside this central grant giving means that Freemasonry under the United Grand Lodge of England give £48 Million per year which makes us a force to be reckoned with with regards to charitable giving. Something of which we should all be immensely proud.



In honour of my father, a member of Industria Lodge who is living with Alzheimer's disease, and to raise funds for the 2021 Festival and Alzheimer's Research UK, I undertook a solo 525 mile, 22 day trek through southern Italy along the Via Francigena - an ancient pilgrim route that links Brindisi to Rome.

During the first section of the route from Brindisi I averaged over 30 miles per day with the route travelling via a mixture of rugged coastlines and quiet inland paths through olive groves and vineyards.

I then cut across Italy towards Naples with the route taking me though the mountains of the Campania region. The landscape and weather took a dramatic change with me hitting the first of the significant inclines and experiencing the first of the thunderstorms.

After Naples the route zig-zagged between inland and costal landscapes in the Lazio region with many climbs towards Rome.

My final day became an adventure in itself as I tackled heavy rain, thunderstorms, waterlogged paths and a hailstorm of biblical proportions but despite the weather I successfully completed my walk in St Peter's Square and was afterwards presented with "The Credential" that proved I had completed the pilgrimage.

I received wonderful assistance from the supportive and caring people of Southern Italy and putting aside the poor weather conditions and a few rather scary encounters with angry wild dogs, this most certainly is an adventure that I will never forget and was most proud to complete.

Neil started running in 2011 which helped him to stop smoking and keep his fitness up. He ran his first marathon in 2013 in Bournemouth. In 2017 Neil joined Freemasonry and that year ran 3 marathons.

Early in 2018, Neil decided to challenge himself by running 12 marathons in 12 months, however, by the end of the year, he had completed 21 marathons in total! So with the dawning of 2019, it seemed like a good idea to run 52 marathons in 52 weeks. and, being a passionate Freemason, Neil thought the ideal charity to run for would

be the Bucks 2021 Festival in aid of the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF).

The year did not start too well for Neil as he was due to run a

double marathon over the weekend of the 5th and 6th of January but had an injury that meant he only completed the one. After some physiotherapy, he was back running and completed the marathon he had missed.

Some of the achievements he has completed over the year have been the "Quadzilla" which is 4 Marathons in 4 days in February and



another being "week at the knees" which is 7 marathons in 7 days back in March. During October, Neil also competed the Snowdonia Marathon and has run a

few 50k races (roughly 31 miles).

The Puzzle Centre is a charity which promotes and delivers early intervention for young children with Autism or communication difficulties and provides training and outreach to families and practitioners across the UK. Materials purchased

with the grant will help to make picture cards and emotion fobs which allow non-verbal children to express themselves and for parents and teachers to give simple instructions.

Sarah Dolder, from The Puzzle Centre, thanked the BMCF for the donation and included comments from parents whose child had benefitted and progressed due to the use of the PECS system and the interventions of the centre.

High Tea for MK Carers

The BMCF (Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund) were delighted to award MK Carers £330 to enable them to treat 30 adult carers to an afternoon tea at Dobbies Garden Centre in Bletchley.

Many of the Carers look after loved ones who are incapacitated and require round the clock care.

Being able to leave home even for a short time requires a lot of organisation. The afternoon gave them a chance to catch up with other carers to have a light-hearted chat, tea and cakes.

APGM Phil Blacklaw, Andrew Hough, Mike Clanfield and John Waller were invited to attend by Beth Sawyers, Fundraising Manager. It was an



enjoyable afternoon, with good company and well-deserved break for the carers.

One of the carers said 'It was so nice to have some time away from my responsibilities and meet other carers who really understand. It is impossible to overestimate the benefits trips like this mean to carers so thank you to the Freemasons.'

Animal Antiks

The BMCF (Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund) recently awarded a grant of £2500 to Animal Antiks.

This has gone towards the installation of new gates at the facility which will enable a fully flexible layout and permit service users to access all the different animals even in wheelchairs and pushchairs. As well as this, the gates will be fitted with baseboards

which will help maintain high hygiene standards by containing straw and animal waste, keeping access walkways clean.

Animal Antiks operates an alternative day provision based on a 230-acre working farm in North Marston, near Buckingham. It welcomes and supports children and adults who are experiencing various challenges in their lives. This can include physical and mental health difficulties, difficulties accessing mainstream education or being at risk of school exclusion or experiencing social isolation and exclusion. It supports around 50 people a week and caters for all ages - with their youngest being 5 and their eldest in

her 50's. Some just attend for a couple of hours a week, whilst others attend full time and carry out their education onsite.

Andrew Hough recently visited the farm as the Secretary of the BMCF to see the difference the

new gates had made for those with mobility and motor skills issues. He enjoyed his visit helping to muck-out and feed some of the animals.


Having a ball!

Ward who is severely visually impaired
due to Congenital Glaucoma, a braille
Machine. This was to enable his
parents to make him braille books as
there are limited suitable braille books
for young children.

Dexter's parents have now produced 4 books for him to enjoy which follow the exploits of "Scruffy the Uffy". The books are all in a giant font, tactile and in braille. The drawings have been produced with visually impaired children in mind.

Dexter's mother Julie-Ann has received requests from a number of parents of children with visual impairment, for copies of the books, so far they complied a few books but would like to produce more. The books cost over £8 to produce and

an hour to make. The donation from the BMCF will make it possible for them to produce even more books.

Recently Dexter who is now 4 was visited by Bucks Assistant Provincial Grand Master Phil Blacklaw accompanied by Bucks Provincial Communications Officer John Waller to see how he is doing. They took him a TLC (Tender Loving Care) teddy which he loved.

Dexter has had a number of surgeries and lost all vision in his right eye however he still has some limited vision in his left eye. That doesn't stop him running around, chatting and enjoying life. He wanted to show Phil and John his toys and really seemed to enjoy the visit.

Julie-Ann intends to write new books for Dexter as he gets older and make them available to other children who are visually impaired.

The BMCF recently funded two men to attend the Nihon Dutch Shensho Judo tournament in Eindhoven, Holland.

Shaun Banks and Sean McKellar competed against individuals worldwide in a tournament for those with learning difficulties.

Shaun and Sean are both members of Stokenchurch Judo Club and have competed in many

tournaments in the past. At 52, Sean McKellar was the oldest in the group and had to compete in four challenging contests before emerging victorious with a gold medal. Shaun Banks also competed in four contests and managed to beat an impressive



challenger who was much bigger than him. He gained a bronze medal. Jean Cleere, who organised the funding and accompanied the group to the event thanked the BMCF for the contribution which facilitated the two competitors success.

Teddies for Loving Care Update...

The (MCF) Masonic Charitable Foundation, are now centrally administering the TLC (Teddies for Loving Care) Masonic Charity, but importantly, it will remain locally-led.

At the MCF/TLC Regional Forum at Freemasons Hall, the Program's new logo was revealed. It features a heart-shaped nose, as in the MCF Logo, with the Red and Orange head and ears symbolising an adult and child hugging.

Brand new Teddies for the Children's Hospitals will soon be rolling in, together with new environmentally friendly packaging, and full compliance certification.

To date, 2.5 Million Teddies have been donated to Children's



A&E units across the country since it's dawning 18 years ago. The MCF give \$150,000 for victims of Australian bush fires

People who have lost everything in the catastrophic Australian bushfires will be among those to benefit from a grant of AUS\$150,000 (£79,000) from the MCF to the Disaster Relief Funds set up by Freemasons in Australia.

The grant from the English and Welsh Freemasons' charity will see AUS\$50,000 given to the Australian Freemasons' Disaster Relief Funds in each of the three states most affected by the blaze: New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia.

The unprecedented fires have seen 27 deaths, including a number of firefighters, with 2,136 homes destroyed in New South Wales alone, more than 1,200 of which have burned down since New Year's Eve. Thousands of Australians are living in more than a dozen large evacuation centres, having been forced to flee the blaze.

Meanwhile, hundreds of homes and businesses have been lost in Victoria and South Australia. Many Australians have lost everything and the impact on the livelihoods of ordinary people is vast. The economy will take many years to fully recover.

An estimated 18 million acres of land have been burned, an area almost as large as Ireland. There has been an enormous impact on the environment, with up to a billion animals being killed. The death toll among koala bears alone has led to calls for the animals to be placed on the endangered species list.

Thousands of people at risk of starvation in Southern Africa will be receiving emergency food packs and urgent humanitarian assistance, thanks to a grant of £50,000 from the MCF to Plan International UK.

An estimated 45 million people across Southern Africa are likely to be affected by record high temperatures and low rainfall, which has led to the worst drought for 35 years.

Large Grant Awarded to Bucks Based Charity, Society for Mucopolysaccharide Diseases - £62,725 over 2 years

The Society for Mucopolysaccharide Diseases is the only registered UK charity providing professional support to people affected by Mucopolysaccharide (MPS) and related diseases. MPS and related diseases are a group of 25 genetic conditions which cause progressive physical disability and severe degenerative neurological deterioration resulting for many in

early death. Every eight days, a baby born in the UK is diagnosed. There is no cure for any of these diseases. The charity reaches over 1,500 people annually through its support, information, advocacy and advice.

The grant will fund an Advocacy Support Worker who will provide support to children, young people and their families through regular phone calls, emails and home visits. The support includes emotional support, expert advice, help with filling in forms, e.g. for additional support at school, signposting to relevant local services, help applying for grants such as for lowered light switches and powerchairs, access to peer to peer support and help with independent living. On average, support will be via emails and calls each month as well as



approximately forty face-to-face visits each year. 205 children and young people in England and Wales will be supported each year, and including families the project will help around 500 people.
