APGM John Clark explains: "The Executive has always believed that specialisation lodges are the way forward and, following the formation of the Motorcycle Lodge last year, a Classic Car Lodge was the obvious next step.

"The PGM, Gordon Robertson, immediately agreed to let us go forward with

this; we advertised the idea to the Province and had a superb response.

PSA testing continues to help

Recently the Aylesbury Masonic Centre once again hosted the Graham Fulford Charitable Trust as they carried out PSA testing on local residents.

As part of this initiative – started by PGM Gordon Robertson to raise awareness of prostate cancer in the UK – Bucks masonic centres have been hosting PSA testing sessions since 2015.

The Graham Fulford Trust provides the nursing staff and administrators to oversee the testing. Any freemason in the county can bring a friend along: both can be tested at no charge.

Approximately 10% of those tested have shown elevated test results and have been referred to their GPs for further investigation.

Lloyd Harrison of Buckingham Lodge attended the session and said: "Prostate cancer is one of the biggest killers of men and although a positive PSA test is not in itself indicative of cancer, it can be an early warning. A good friend of mine attended a session some 18 months ago. Following a positive test, he received prompt attention by the NHS and is now fit and healthy and grateful that his cancer was detected and dealt with before it was too late."

Canine Clouseaus!

The sum of £1,000 was recently donated to the Milton Keynes-based charity Medical Detection Dogs (MDD), which was raised at a Ladies Evening Gala Dinner in March.

Medical Assistance Alert Dogs are trained to become partners for people with Diabetes I, Addison's Disease, Narcolepsy and POTS (Postural Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome) or even those with nut allergies.

MDD receives no Government Funding

whatsoever! It costs over £5,000 per day to run the charity. All funds are raised by supporters and volunteers and through a multitude of fund raising events throughout the county. Roman Way Chapter and some Bletchley Lodges are also supporting the charity.

Currently the charity is undertaking a clinical trial into prostate, kidney and bladder cancers with Milton Keynes University Hospital.

A new trial into the detection of malaria in collaboration with Durham University, the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine and Medical Research Council Unit in the Gambia, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, is also under way.

HATS off to overseas visits!

Over the years, trips have been taken by Bucks masons to lodges in other provinces and constitutions. Following the Heatherden Lodge visit to Cyprus in 2016, it was decided to consider forming a lodge to promote regular visits to other lodges, both in the UK and abroad.

This has led to the formation of *Hands Across the Seas* or HATS, aiming to make three visits a year: one to a lodge abroad, one to another province and a third which could be abroad, within the UK or supporting another lodge within Bucks.

HATS will start in October 2017; at this stage, membership will be informal, with a small committee to arrange the visits. It will be open to any mason of any rank and from any province or recognised constitution. It is hoped to swell the numbers from members of lodges visited. Members would not be expected to attend every meeting.

The objective is to experience masonry in unusual venues and with different workings, and to promote a new and interesting strand

for experienced masons. It will also give an opportunity for wives, partners and families to join in, making a holiday out of such visits.

After three years the position will be reviewed in order to reassess recruitment and make a decision as to whether there should be a formal proposal to found a lodge. This will build on the successes of the group and allow members to put themselves forward as founders. It will continue with its travelling and visiting theme but on a formalised basis, with dispensations for meetings outside Bucks, and an annual meeting within the province for the installation of the Master and officers.

Foreign venues under consideration are the USA, Thailand, Malaysia and the Philippines where relations with other lodges already exist, but it is hoped that contacts with lodges in countries closer to home will also be fostered.

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John (Jack) Surridge 10th September 1933 – 13th February 2017

John Surridge – better known to all as Jack – was a retired Garage Manager, latterly at Beaconsfield Motors.

He was Initiated into the Princes Risborough Lodge in December 1978 and remained a member of this lodge for 39 years.

He was also a member or Honorary Member of six Craft Lodges and one Chapter, and a Founder Member of Wendover Lodge; he held almost every office in those lodges, including Worshipful Master

However, he will be best remembered for being the Tyler for twenty-two lodges and was still tyling for nineteen at the time of his death. He was also Janitor for thirteen Chapters and was still active with ten when he died.

He was Exalted into Princes Risborough Chapter in 1983 and was a companion of the Royal Arch for twenty-four years.

Jack's passion was motorcycling but it wasn't until the Consecration of the Buckinghamshire Motorcycle Lodge, when he was invested as the 'primus' Senior Warden and pictures were displayed showing him performing on bikes he had built, that some members realised how dedicated he was to the sport.



It was in his early years that Jack's love of all things mechanical and speed developed.

He was called up in 1950 aged 17, joining the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (REME). He trained at Honiton before finally ending up in the Highlands of Scotland where he learned to ski and ice skate, competing in both for the Army. He also joined the Army motorcycle trials team.

After his National Service, Jack invested in a competition bike, taking up grass track racing and scrambling, as well as having a dabble at speedway.

In 1956 his motorcycle racing career came to a shocking end when he was involved in a head on collision whilst riding his bike. He spent many months in hospital before being deemed well enough to be discharged.

In celebration of this passion, a motorcycle hearse was used at his funeral and there was a motorbike escort by members of the Bucks Motorcycle Lodge.

Jack was a keen supporter of the Thames Valley Air Ambulance and used his persuasive powers to ensure almost everyone who met him came away with the air ambulance lapel badge!

Brinley Lloyd Edwards

5th November 1946 – 14th March 2017

Brin was born in mid-Wales and only spoke Welsh until the age of 10. On leaving school at 15 he was offered an apprenticeship in plumbing with the Llandeilo town council which he completed in 1967 to become a first class craftsman.

Brin continued his training after moving to Guildford and joining Drake & Scull in their overseas department before being sent to Lagos in 1969 where he met his future wife, Chris.

While he had many hobbies and interests his greatest love was freemasonry. He was initiated into Ebute Metta Lodge, Nigeria in 1972 and later became a joining member of Temple Manor Lodge in



Marlow in 1973. He went on to join several lodges and to become a Deputy Provincial

Grand Director of Ceremonies in Buckinghamshire. He was appointed to the acting grand rank of Assistant Grand Standard Bearer in 2008.

He was involved in many events and ideas in the province of Buckinghamshire including starting up the Provincial Shows Team, and was always on hand to undertake any tasks in the setting up of the annual Provincial Meeting.

Brin started his own plumbing company, Edwards Engineering Services, in 1979, which expanded to Edwards Heating Ltd in September 1988. The company grew successfully for many years and became a leader in the heating industry in Buckinghamshire.

£125,000 raised for good causes

On Sunday 7th May a cheque presentation session was held at the Aylesbury Masonic Centre when more than £125,000 was donated to local and national charities and good causes.

Hosted by APGM Graham Dearing, the major cheque for £35,000 was for the South Central Ambulance Service NHS Trust to cover the cost of two brand new First Responder vehicles to be deployed in the county. The money was donated by the Bucks' Masonic Centenary Fund (BMCF) in memory of Rodney Meerza.

Among the many other recipients were the Thames Valley Air Ambulance, the Aylesbury Prostate Cancer Support Group, Child Bereavement UK, the Gateway Club and the Disability Karate Federation, a registered charity that creates mass participation in martial arts for people who are disabled, disadvantaged or living with poverty.

PGM Gordon Robertson attended with his wife, Fran, who collected a cheque on behalf of Macmillan Nurses from Marlow Bridge Lodge (£1,147). Additionally, a total of £35,775 was donated to the Festival by Marcellians, Wineslai, Manor of Swanburn and Burke Lodges.

Putting his stamp on it!

The Isle of Man Post Office wanted to mark 300 years of Freemasonry and recognise the vast charitable donations made by the organisation in the Isle of Man and elsewhere.

Ben Glazier, a member of Hampden Lodge, explained his involvement in the design of these Tercentenary stamps: "I was commissioned to do this a long time ago by the Isle of Man Post Office. The Royal Mail is not producing a set, so I worked with Grand Lodge, which has adopted these as the official stamps of the Tercentenary Celebrations."

The stamps gained Royal Approval a few weeks ago and were presented to His Royal Highness, The Duke of Kent in May to mark his 50th year as Grand Master.

A close look at the stamps will show the names of six lodges, one of which is Hampden Lodge. This means that the lodge will go into the histories and records of the Tercentenary and will, of course, feature in Stanley Gibbons reference books forever.



Commemorating the brave men of WWI

Colin White, Master of Bulwer Lodge of Cairo, and his partner Helen, had the privilege of being one of sixty-four masters attending the unveiling of the Victoria Cross Memorial at Freemasons' Hall by HRH The Duke of Kent on 25th April. He also attended a reception hosted by the Grand Master after the event.

The memorial commemorates the sixtyfour freemasons who won the VC in the First World War



Hugo Vivian Hope Throssell was initiated into Bulwer Lodge of Cairo on 15th June 1916,

one of four holders of the VC to become members of the lodge.

Australian born, Throssell received the decoration for his services during the WWI fight for Hill 60, south of Ypres on the Western Front, which led to the British and Empire troops gaining possession of this important battlefield. The other VCs who were members of Bulwer were:

William Thomas Marshall (Initiated on 18th July 1885), awarded the medal in May 1884 for his conspicuous bravery during the cavalry charge at El Teb in bringing out of action the severely wounded Lieutenant-Colonel Barrow, of the 19th Hussars, who would otherwise have been killed.

Tasmanian-born John Hutton Bisdee (Initiated on 6th January 1917) was awarded the VC on 1st September 1900, the first

'colonial' to receive it. His advance scouting patrol was ambushed in a narrow gorge near the town of Warm Baths, north of Pretoria. Despite continuous heavy fire from the Boers, Bisdee rescued a badly wounded officer.

Charles George Baker was a British Merchant Navy officer, a Bengal Army officer, a Turkish Army officer and head of the Egyptian Police. He joined Bulwer Lodge of Cairo on 3rd March 1888. While serving as Second Officer aboard the Douro, a passenger vessel of the P&O Steam Navigation Company, Baker was instrumental in rescuing the passengers and crew of the Douro which was wrecked on the north shoal, following a nerve-wracking journey totalling over 500 miles.



Bowen chapter becomes a patron

A piece of history was made at the Bowen Chapter convocation held on Ist June, when EComp Derek Watts, Provincial Grand Charity Steward, announced that this was the first meeting in his career that he would be leaving with more money than he came with!

The occasion was the Exaltation of Stephen Cleary but Derek had been invited along to accept a £1,000 cheque from the Charity Steward, EComp Denver Lynn, as a Bowen Chapter contribution to the 2021 Festival

The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, John Keeble, is very keen that Buckinghamshire Chapters support the Festival, and this donation from Bowen Chapter now makes them a Patron.

Mentoring 'ready to go'

It has taken over two years to produce the Provincial Mentoring programme, but now it's is ready to go.

Firstly, mentoring workshops took place to find out what support lodge mentors wanted. Next, breakfast white table presentations were held to find out what support new members would like when they joined freemasonry and what questions their wives had. Discussions were then held with many personal mentors to get an understanding of how they wanted to support the Initiates. Presentations were given around the Province to lodges, the Provincial Grand Officers club, the Secretary's Lodge and at all centres. Finally, during that time two mentoring seminars were run which were open to all members.

In February this year, a series of five seminars was organised to roll out the full mentoring programme. This supports and supplies documents for lodge mentors, new members and personal mentors. All lodge mentors have been sent information and links to these documents so they can now fully support all members and candidates.

This year saw something completely new for mentoring education, the first Mentoring Webinar (online seminar). It was organised as a

question and answer session with members from the Winslow centre who are doing some amazing mentoring and retention work. The event looked at their work with regard to mentoring and best practice.

From feedback received, this was a great success so will be used again. If you would like your lodge to be interviewed about your mentoring work, please contact Eugene Matthias, Provincial Grand Mentor at: mentor@buckspgl.org.

Retention is something that all Provinces are having to look at. To support this, the mentoring team has recruited Ashley Dart,



Mentoring Training Officer, who will be arranging a series of five ongoing mentoring workshops which will be available to all members. These will be held at Slough, Marlow, Beaconsfield, Aylesbury and Bletchley, starting in November 2017 and running through to April 2018.
