## Thanks to hospice

Bob Newton, Master of Marlow Bridge Lodge, recently presented a cheque for £600 to the Thames Hospice in Windsor in memory of his mother.

As Bob explained: "Some twenty years ago it was discovered that my mum had a huge cancerous growth in her chest. It wasn't long after that her health deteriorated very quickly.

The BMCF has granted £20,000 to the 'Same Chances' programme, designed to work with young carers as

they transition into adulthood and independence whilst continuing to provide unpaid care for an ill or disabled family member.

In the UK there are an estimated 700,000 young carers, 2,500 of them in Buckinghamshire. The Young Adult Carers service started in September 2015 with the target to support 50 young carers living in this Province within the first 18 months.

In just over two years, the team has connected with and supported double that figure within the county.

Sally Mansi, Young Carers Service Manager, said: "We're very grateful to Buckinghamshire Freemasons for their generous grant. It will support 80 young carers as they move into adulthood, giving them some of the same life choices and opportunities as their peers."

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## **Back to school for Winslow masons**

It was back to school for a party of Winslow masons recently when they attended the presentation of a specially adapted minibus at Furze Down School.

Freemasons from the Eliot Hall Masonic Centre in Winslow and representatives of the BMCF, together with Lady Taverners, gathered to hand over the minibus to the school.

Furze Down School, which has over 100 students between the ages of two and nineteen with complex special educational

needs, admits youngsters from a wide area of Buckinghamshire.

The new minibus is specially adapted to enable easy wheelchair access, including a lift to the rear entrance doors and seats which can be reconfigured to allow several wheelchair users to travel securely. Previously, such students would have had to travel separately from their more able-bodied classmates when on trips and visits.

Despite the inclement weather, the

students enthusiastically gathered for photographs during the handover to their Headteacher, Alison Rooney.

This was followed with a lively assembly in which the students thanked those present and everyone who had worked to make it possible. The children had also made cards to express their appreciation which were presented to the lodge members and the members of the BMCF.



## **New vehicles for Community First Responders**

Lodges meeting at Eliot Hall in Winslow have teamed up with the BMCF to provide a small fleet of 4 x 4 vehicles to serve all areas of rural Buckinghamshire.

PGM John Clark recently presented the latest addition to the fleet at Horwood House, assisted by APGMs Graham Dearing and Phil Blacklaw.

Community First Responders (CFR) are all highly trained volunteers: they do not get paid for the many hours they give in support of their communities. Neither do they receive support from the NHS or local government.

Each CFR lives and works in the community served and is able to start life-saving treatments in a wide variety of medical emergencies such as stroke, choking and serious injuries, prior to the arrival of an ambulance. The CFRS can also transport medical staff from the air ambulance landing point.

In rural areas it is often difficult to reach incidents in the responder's own car and an off-road capability is invaluable. Steve Acton, the CFR for the Winslow area and a member of Saxon Lodge, first highlighted the need over two years ago. Since then the BMCF and the Winslow lodges have worked together to build the fleet and extend the area of Buckinghamshire covered. The fundraising has been boosted by the generous bequest of the late Rodney Meerza who was also a Winslow mason.

The vehicles provided all have the 4X4

capability essential at some incidents on local farms and bridleways and are fitted with scene lighting bars for night use as well as alley lights to enable the user to see street numbers easily at night. They have been placed to serve the communities of Winslow, Marlow and Thame/Haddenham.

Earlier in the year, all three vehicles were regularly called on to assist in areas of heavy snowfall or muddy conditions and have definitely helped to save lives in times of medical emergency.



## Provincial cheque presentation evening

The most striking feature of the recent cheque presentation evening was the broad range of charities represented, all championed and supported by Buckinghamshire Freemasons.

The representatives of the charities enjoyed a buffet and the chance to network with other charities and freemasons from all over Buckinghamshire.

The evening was compered by APGM Graham Dearing, ably assisted by Mike Clanfield, Provincial Grand Charity Steward

In a packed programme, charities, both local and international, described their work and explained how the funds they had received would enable them to continue and expand.

Among the recipients was the Cancer and Haematology Fund, based at Stoke Mandeville Hospital. Receiving the cheque for £25,000 on its behalf were Dr Helen Eagleton and June Wilson, OBE. Although long retired, June was the first Clinical Nurse Manager in this field and received her honours for her work and tireless fundraising.

Dr Darayus Motivala from the Chiltern MS Centre based in Wendover told the audience how their new building offers over 300 treatments a week. These have limited or no availability

on the NHS but can be invaluable for MS sufferers and include hydrotherapy, reiki and yoga. Paul Crockett from the MCF presented a cheque for £30,000.

Based in St Albans, Crohns and Colitis UK received £2,500 from John Waller of St Giles Lodge. This will enable the charity to continue research into these conditions as well as assisting with its grants programme for sufferers. Rachel Covey from the charity informed the audience that they receive no government funding yet Crohns and Colitis affect one in two hundred of the population.

A cheque for £2,500 was presented to the Bede Griffiths Charity Trust. This started in 2003 and helps young, old and those in between in India. The money will support a school for 300 primary students, a home for the elderly and continuing courses to retrain women, enabling them to enter the workplace. Their representative explained



how far the money would go in India and what it could achieve.

The evening was brought to a close by the PGM, John Clark, who had previously received contributions for the MCF from many lodges in the Province. He explained the work of the MCF and thanked all those who had organised and supported a very worthwhile evening.

The total amount presented was nearly £161,000 which exceeds previous amounts presented.

  Additionally nearly £23,000 was raised for the 2021 Festival.

The BMCF also made the following awards:

- Rennie Grove Hospice £1,850 for two new computers which will be used by Hospice at Home Nurses to enable more efficient work practices whilst visiting patients, mainly in Buckinghamshire, saving admin time and increasing patient contact time.
- Young Deaf Activities £5,000 for various trips including summer holiday outings. (YDA website www.yda.org.uk)
- Aylesbury Youth Motor Project (AYMP) was awarded £952 for the cost of computer software to allow students to complete Functional Skills Qualifications which form part of an extension course for students who have struggled with academic qualifications and to enable them to raise self-esteem and confidence to make learning easier.

From September 2018 AYMP will be providing Functional Skills qualifications alongside the usual Motor Vehicle qualifications and the Office suite will enable the students to complete the ICT section of the qualification.

- Citizens Advice, Aylesbury Vale Branch, has been granted £5,000 for ten new computers, laptops and associated equipment to provide seventy volunteers access to services over a wide
- Poplar Grove Surgery Friends were awarded £500 to buy landscaping material and a gazebo to create a garden area (see photo below). There was also enough to help with the establishment of a café.
- First Holtspur Scout Group were awarded £500 to help provide equipment for their new scout headquarters.
- £2,500 to the Milton Keynes Branch of the Motor Neurone Disease Association to help with

## Cheque: a 'personal tribute'

Jesse Eatson, IPM of Wendover Lodge, presented a cheque for £1,500 to Judith Duguid, Cystic Fibrosis specialist nurse and outpatient senior sister at CF Care based at Frimley Park Hospital.

The CF charity is dedicated to helping Frimley Park Hospital provide the best possible treatment and care for teenagers and young adults in Surrey, Hampshire and adjacent counties. The amount donated by the lodge will be displayed on the tree in the form of a star.

Kelly, the daughter of Jesse and his wife Caroline, was born with CF which is a genetic disease affecting the movement of salt and water across the cells within the body.

This can lead to thick mucous congesting the internal organs, particularly the lungs and

bowel, making it harder to breathe and absorb food.

It is estimated that one in every 2,500 babies born in the UK will have cystic fibrosis and there are more than 10,000 people living with the condition in this country.

Kelly's health suffered badly as she got older and it was only after moving to Surrey and attending Frimley Park Cystic Fibrosis Care unit that her life was turned around.

As part of his Master's charity, Jesse was pleased to present the cheque as a small token of appreciation for the treatment given to Kelly.

Stan was born in West London on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1925. He joined the army aged 18 years and, whilst on active service in Normandy, he was seriously wounded. Stan was repatriated and subsequently discharged as medically unfit for active service.

Stan was made a Chevalier in the Order National de la Legion d'Honneur by the French Government in recognition of his service in the liberation of France.

After the war Stan married Joan and they lived happily for 7 I years. Sadly Joan recently passed away after a long illness. They had a son and daughter who in turn gave them grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Stan joined Beaconsfield Lodge in April 1958 and twelve years later became WM. He served as the lodge secretary for thirteen years through the late eighties and early nineties where he proved to be a superb

The latest rounds of Charity Steward Seminars were well attended and thank you to all of those Charity Stewards who made them. It is only by sharing experiences that we can hope to achieve our own goals.

Every month that now goes by is a month close to the end of the Festival so in short we have work to do.

## Masonic festivals in numbers

- I. The highest total achieved in any one Festival is thought to be  $\pounds 7,746,319$  for Hants and IOW 2016
- 2. The highest per capita figure is currently held by Nottinghamshire at  $\pounds 1,070$  per member
- 3. The total amount raised through the four Festivals that ended in 2017 was £10,838,399. If this was represented in £1 coins it would weigh 102,964,790 grams or the same as fourteen London Routemaster buses
- 4. The Relief Chest scheme handles on average 23,000 gift aid envelopes *per month*!!!

## A Fairway Union made in Aylesbury!



When the Royal Arch Chapter of Buckinghamshire was formed on 16th February 1891 the Very Rev John Studholme Brownrigg, MA was appointed as Grand Superintendent.

At that time there were only three Royal Arch Chapters in the Province, St Barnabas, Buckingham and St George's, with a total of seventy-seven members.

Over the next hundred years or so the Royal Arch in Buckinghamshire developed and expanded and today there are more than one thousand Companions in Buckinghamshire.

The union and amalgamation of two Royal Arch Chapters in Buckinghamshire has been rare in occurrence.

On 11th April this year an extraordinary convocation of Provincial Grand Chapter was held at the Masonic Hall in Aylesbury to oversee only the second such amalgamation, when Aylesbury Chapter combined with Fairway forming the Aylesbury Fairway Chapter. The Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, John Keeble, presided over this meeting, assisted by his Executive and Acting Officers of the year and witnessed by

a great number of distinguished guests.


On 14th May 1947 EComp Major Alfred GT Smith, the then Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, consecrated the Aylesbury Chapter at the Aylesbury Masonic Hall. At the consecration, the aspirations and hopes of the Chapter founders were celebrated. Some thirty-five years later, on 22nd September 1982, EComp Sir Ralph Verney, Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, consecrated Fairway Chapter, with those same ideals.

At that time freemasonry was still in a period of growth and its future seemed secure. However, Aylesbury reached a position where it found itself unable to continue and was faced with two options: surrender the Charter or seek an amalgamation or 'Union'.

In April 1958, Bob Graham embarked on his Masonic Career in Bedlington, Northumberland, with St Cuthbert's Lodge which was constituted on 23rd June 1881.

Bob and his father were initiated together. Bob was passed to the 2nd degree in May 1958 and in June of that year was raised to the 3rd degree, becoming a Master Mason.

Teacher Bob and his family moved to Tripoli and then to Kampala, where he eventually become Head of Nakasero School. Whilst in Uganda, Bob discovered the true international nature of freemasonry as he met another expat when they first arrived who was in a local lodge and also discovered that his headmaster was a mason! In March 1967, Bob joined the Victoria Nyanza Lodge.

On returning to England, the family settled near Seer Green and, to cut a long story short, Bob became one of the 18 founder members of Seer Green Lodge which was consecrated on 4th December 1982 at the Bellhouse Hotel, Beaconsfield.

Bob took the office of Junior Warden and served the lodge as Worshipful Master in 1984 and again in 2006. He will return to the Chair of King Solomon at the October Installation meeting.

## **Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund**

## An interview with Andrew Hough, Hon Secretary, BMCF

Q

When and why was the Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund set up?

It was set up as a charitable trust in December 1991 to celebrate 100 years of Freemasonry in the Province.

The object is to 'apply the income for or towards such charitable institutions and/or the relief of poverty and distress at such time and in such a manner as the Trustees may in their absolute discretion think fit'.

#### Q: Who are the Trustees?

A: The Trustees are Hugh Douglas Smith (Chairman), Graham Dearing and Phil Blacklaw.

The BMCF committee comprises the DPGM, the Provincial Almoner, Provincial Charity Steward, Treasurer, Secretary and Communications Officer, plus area representatives from Slough, Marlow, Aylesbury, Beaconsfield and North of the Province.

#### Q: Where do the grants go?

A: They go to non-masonic local charities or to individuals in Buckinghamshire who are struggling to finance a particular need or device, for example, a stairlift. Lodges and individual members are encouraged to identify local charities. The committee will also consider supporting individual lodges with additional funding.

We do occasionally go outside the Province, for example, Slough and the Rennie Grove Hospice which is actually based in Hertfordshire but serves a lot of the Chilterns and therefore people who live in Bucks.

#### Q: How do charities apply?

A: We now have a formal application form and a charity can only apply once every three years. The Committee, on behlaf of the

Trustees ensure due diligence when vetting the charities or individuals to ensure they are genuinely in need.

Another area is supporting the mayoral charities, particularly if they are local.

#### Q: Where does the money come from?

A: Some money comes from the original investment that was raised and the revenues generated from that, and that's variable. There are also bequests from private individuals. One such bequest enabled us to buy the first two First Responders vehicles.

However, the main income is from voluntary contributions made by each lodge in the Province. Currently there is only a 75% uptake from the lodges with each lodge member paying an annual contribution of just

£3 as part of the subscription. Last year we distributed about £42,000.

The accounts are properly audited and the auditors ensure the governance of the funds is correct.

#### Q: What do you want people to do?

**A:** We can only give if we get. There are around 3,800 lodge members at the moment so, if we could get all lodges contributing, we could do a lot more.

#### Q: How are you raising awareness?

A: We want to raise the profile through Concord, through the Provincial Grand Officers Club, Lodge Secretaries, Visiting Officers.

Additionally, from October the Provincial Wardens – Webster Springer (Senior Warden) and Darren Mantell (Junior Warden) will be on the committee and they will have an important role in raising the profile of the BMCF.

Recipients receive a plaque or some form of recognition that they have received funding from the BMCF and nearly all of them are happy for the donation to be publicised.

The important part of the story is the impact: it's not giving the cheque, it's what impact has the money made to this organisation? It's the special chair for Willen Hospice or the additional physiotherapy for MS sufferers or an exercise bike or a defibrillator or an activities holiday for young deaf people, that's the most important thing.

The half-time prediction competition raised £29 for charity and Jim Lumsden made the nearest prediction of the final score.



## Web brought me into freemasonry

Texan Steve Blair, the Provincial Website Editor, came to the UK in the mid 1990s and moved to Marlow in 2010.

As a youngster, he had seen some old pictures in his grandmother's house of 'men in dark suits' and subsequently discovered that several members of his family, including his paternal grandfather, had been freemasons.

He eventually decided to investigate what freemasonry was all about and, as an IT man, looked on Google. This now being 2010, he found the original Bucks Provincial website.

Steve explained that the website was exceptionally helpful because it's without any pressure: "It points you into the masonic world, gives a reasonable overview of who we are and what we do and a basic understanding of what goes on."

Having clicked on the link, he was directed to the form which, however, gave him no idea of what he might be getting into! A couple of weeks later he was called by Provincial Grand Secretary, Derek Watts, who invited him for an informal meal with their wives.

Derek took Steve through the basics and asked him why he wanted to become a freemason to which Steve replied: "I like helping others without taking credit".

Having made the decision to join and having given Derek details of family members who had been masons, Steve explained that, because of his work schedule, a lodge meeting on a Saturday would be ideal. By coincidence, Derek belonged to a lodge that met on a Saturday, which was Bourne End.

Steve was then invited to a garden party being held by lodge member Jim Tilbury and his wife, Jo, where he met Dave Hollis of the MTSFC. Again, by coincidence, Steve had been fishing since he was about five years old and, to jump forward a few years, is now the Casting Secretary of the MTSFC!

Steve was invited for interview to discuss the possibility of his joining Bourne End Lodge and one of the questions was: "How long do you intend to stay in this country?" to which the answer was: "I have a mortgage, I have an English wife and two English stepsons. I don't intend to leave any time soon!"

Steve was subsequently initiated into Bourne End Lodge in 2011 and will be installed as WM in October this year.

Steve commented that Bourne End had been very supportive and was exceptionally good at mentoring: "Whoever proposes you typically mentors you in the lodge but everyone will help out. It's a very welcoming attitude."

As well as taking most offices in the lodge,

Steve has also been involved in running the Freemasonry in the Community garden at Marlow Bridge station.

However, his main involvement has been with the MTSFC, finding people to be casters. He explained that, in the last seven years they had taken more than 500 kids fishing and, since it started some 12 years ago, more than 1,000 children had benefitted: "It is incredibly heartwarming and enriching to help them and see the looks on the kids' faces."

It was at an MTSFC event that Steve met PGM John Clark who invited him to take on an IT role in updating the Provincial website, along with Hugh Douglas Smith, who had built it, and Paul Brissenden Hemstock.

Steve is determined to maintain a consistent 'face' through social media, using not only the website but Facebook and Twitter as well. As he said: "It's full circle - I came to freemasonry through the website. Now I'm helping produce it and taking pride in what we've got out there. It's a treasure trove of information and people should use it more. If you've got a friend who's interested in freemasonry, send them to the Provincial website, to the page that says 'Enquire about being a freemason'. There are several thousand of us in this Province and, when friends and family ask what we do, send them to the website. That's us! And if they ask, how do we know if this really works, well, the guy who's the editor came to freemasonry through the website!

"Later you should look at 'Beyond the Craft' to find out about the other orders. It helps you understand the journey you're going to go. I joined Royal Arch in Bourne End Chapter."

Steve is also a member of Nelson Cork Lodge and was a founder of the Classic Car Lodge, another of his passions.

## **OBITUARY**



Norman David Christy FCA, CA 13th May 1937 – 8th May 2018

Norman Christy was well known throughout the Province as Treasurer for many lodges and organist for many more.

He was a great supporter of the Beaconsfield Masonic Centre and was Treasurer and Company Secretary to Beaconsfield Masonic Centre Ltd and Treasurer for Beaconsfield Masonic and Community Centre for 32 years.

He was initiated into Boston Manor Lodge in the Province of Middlesex in 1965 and joined Hundred of Stoke Lodge in Buckinghamshire in 1970. Altogether, he was a member of ten lodges, including two in London.

He was appointed Provincial Grand Treasurer for Middlesex in 1985, an office he held until 2015. He received the Grand Rank of Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1990 and was promoted to Past Junior Grand Deacon in 1998.

He was exalted into Ditton Chapter in the Province of Surrey in 1968 and joined Windsor End Chapter in Buckinghamshire in 1994.

Norman joined George Hay and Company, Accountants, in 1953, was Articled to the late George Hay and qualified in 1959. He became a partner in 1967, Senior Partner in 1974 and was a fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales and a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Scotland.

Norman had many interests outside freemasonry. He was a devout collector of ephemera, especially concerning railways! The collection includes many model engines still in their original boxes, as well as station signs and bus stops. He was also a founder and treasurer of The Squirrels (a charity that provides support particularly to the elderly in and around his home in Bourne End) and was a director of the Dart Valley Railway.

He leaves five children and seven grandchildren and will be sorely missed by all who knew him.

Have you ever wondered what duties are entailed in the work of the various Officers of the Province?

In a return to a series of articles, we look at the work of the **Provincial Communications Officer for Buckinghamshire**, **John Waller**.



Since starting this role last November, I have found it to be both demanding and interesting.

APGM Phil Blacklaw and I meet up regularly to discuss what is coming up and how to best use the articles I have. Phil is very supportive and has assisted me in settling into this new role.

Most days I receive emails regarding upcoming events or about events that have recently taken place.

Some contributors are very good and send in articles and photos that can be published with very little effort. Other contributions, however, might be a little sparse on information or the photos are either too low definition to be of use (they should be at least I Megabyte) or are out of focus or don't mention who is in them.

Where possible, photos should show how the donation was raised or used, rather than showing a (small) cheque being presented. For example, photos illustrating a hard slog up a hill or children enjoying new equipment, better illustrate how much effort was made to raise money for a charity.

I always welcome good photos that we can use. We are lucky in this province to have some very talented photographers who will attend events if requested and are available.

There is an 'Events' form that I can email on request. When completed with as much information as possible, this can really help us promote your event.

I also have the help of Rob Marston (a retired English teacher) to help write articles. Rob is very good at editing stories and making them more interesting.

Additionally, I receive requests from the MCF (Masonic Charitable Foundation) and BMCF (Bucks Masonic Centenary Fund) to help publicise how they spend the money that we donate to them. In such cases, I organise photographers and a senior member of the Province to attend a photo session.

As part of my PCO responsibilities I sit on the BMCF Committee and have a vote on what is donated and follow and report how the donations are spent.

To promote what we do as a Province I submit articles to Concord, the Provincial website team (who also post on Twitter), Freemasonry Today and the local press.

I look after the Provincial Facebook site which I find is a useful way to promote upcoming events and post the stories, photos



and sometimes videos of events that have taken place.

I would appreciate help from anyone who would like to be a media spotter! I send stories to media all over the Province but I don't always know if they have been printed. If you would like to be added to my list and could send me a scan, photos or links to articles it would be a great help.

In my opinion, reporting what we all do for freemasonry helps us understand what a fantastic organisation we are part of and why we are freemasons.
